3.	<p>The metre of this poem is an elegiac couplet, which is traditionally used by Greek poets to show strong grief or love. As he is conflicted and pained, the metre helps to show this.</p>	
	<p>The oxymoron 'adi et amo' shows he feels conflicted and doesn't know what to do with himself. He cannot grasp his feelings and this pains him.</p>	
	<p>'excruer' meaning 'tormented' implies Catullus feels tortured by his emotions. What he feels makes him miserable and it is unending.</p>	
	<p>'fortasse requires?' the use of a rhetorical question emphasises his confusion, as he does not know the answer either. He is searching for answers and cannot find them.</p>

4c	• Ad: 'obdura' meaning 'endure' implies Catullus is not finding the breakup easy. He must fight through his pain to get over it and he finds it difficult.	
	• 'nec miser vive' meaning 'do not live miserably' shows he is pained with sadness. He is trying to snap himself of the misery he feels.	
	• This poem uses a choliambic metre, which puts less stress on the last beat of each line. This makes it more awkward to smoothly read out loud, implying Catullus is troubled, and finds it difficult to say what he is feeling and more an. stop thinking of Lesbia.

5a	• To attend his brother's funeral
	• To visit his dead brother a final time.
5b	• Repetition of family words i.e. 'frater' symbolising his brotherly love that he held.
	• 'ave atque vale' meaning 'hail again and farewell' implies he will always love and ^{never} forget his brother, but this is a final goodbye and he is now gone. (knows he)
	• This poem also uses an elegiac couplet to symbolise his feelings of strong love and mourning for his brother.
	• The reference to fate stealing his brother implies his he didn't want his brother to go and it was not his time. But he now has to accept that what is done is done.
